EXPENSES

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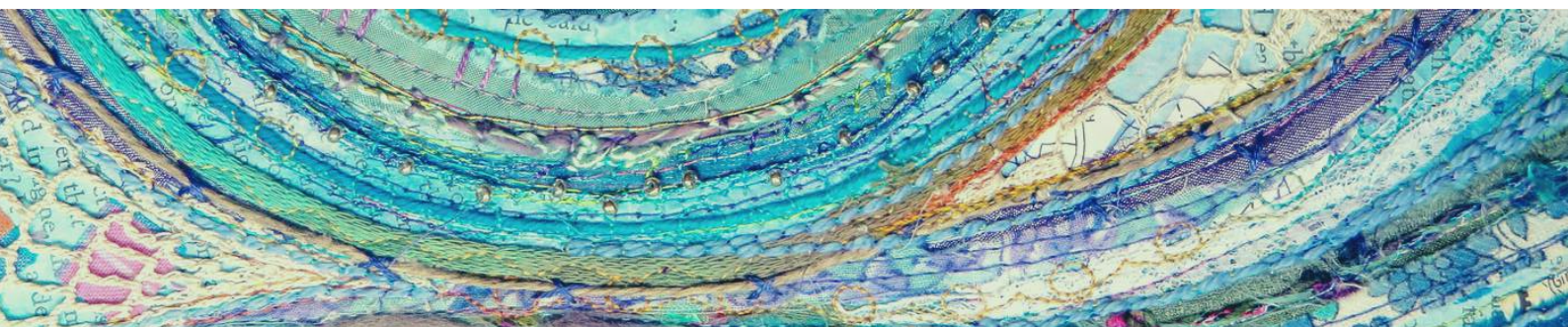

JOSEPHINE AHIKIRE

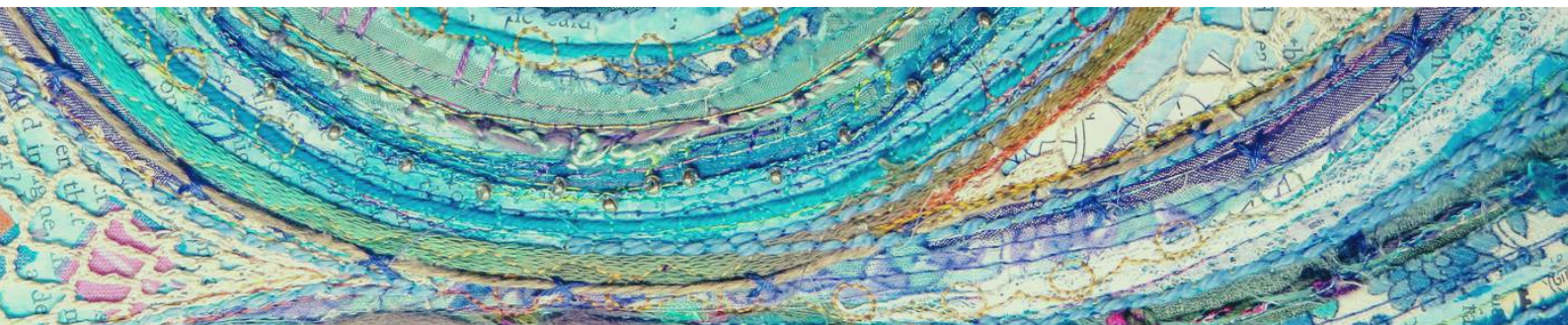

Dr Josephine Ahikire is Professor and the former Dean of the School of Women and Gender Studies, Makerere University. She has been teaching Women and Gender Studies, Makerere University, in the field of women's empowerment, gender, politics and society, livelihood and culture for over 20 years. She has key skills in policy analysis and extensive experience in gender training and gender development practice, as well as extensive experience in qualitative and quantitative research. She has published widely in the fields of gender and politics, labour and cultural studies. Recent publications include a book entitled *Localised or Localising Democracy: Gender and the Politics of Decentralisation in Contemporary Uganda* and two co-edited books *Controlling Consent: Uganda's 2016 Elections* with J. Oloka-Onyango, 2016 and *Gender Poverty and Social Transformation: Reflections on Fractures and Continuities in Contemporary Uganda* with Bantebya et al., 2014. She is an Associate Member of the African Gender Institute (AGI), an Associate Member of the Council for Development of Social Research in Africa (CODESRIA) and Acting Deputy Principal of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences.

KIRSTEN AINLEY

Hub Co-Director and Deputy Principal Investigator
London School of Economics and Political Science

Dr Kirsten Ainley is an Associate Professor of International Relations at the London School of Economics and Political Science. Her research is in the field of global ethics and is concerned with the relationships between politics, law and ethics in international relations. She focuses on international policy and practice in military, legal and development-focused interventions, and the impacts of these interventions. She has published on international criminal law, transitional justice, the International Criminal Court and the Responsibility to Protect in journals such as *The International Journal of Transitional Justice*, *Ethics and International Affairs*, *International Affairs* and the *Cambridge Review of International Affairs*. She is the Principal Investigator of the Justice, Conflict and Development network, which examines



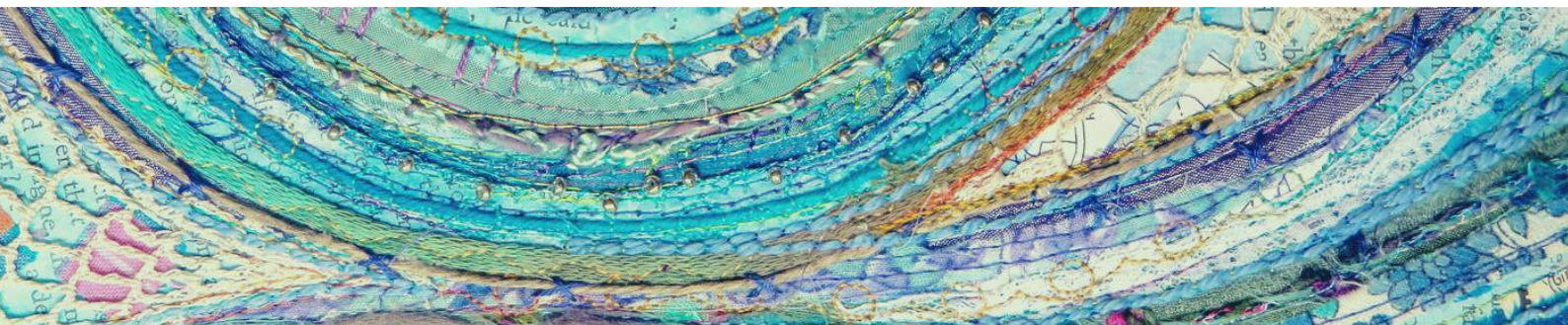

issues at the intersection of peace, justice, and development in the conflict-affected societies of Colombia, Sri Lanka, Syria, and Uganda. She is also Principal Investigator on the Hybrid Justice project, which was established to evaluate the impacts of hybrid criminal courts, tribunals and investigatory mechanisms on conflict-affected states and societies, and a Co-Investigator on the ESRC Strategic Network on Gender Violence across War and Peace. She is the co-author, with Chris Brown, of *Understanding International Relations* (2009) and co-editor (with Rebekka Friedman and Chris Mahony) of *Evaluating Transitional Justice: Accountability and Peacebuilding in Post-Conflict Sierra Leone* (2015).

GRACE AKELLO

Grace Akello, PhD, is currently an Associate Professor, Coordinator of a pioneer Master of Medical Anthropology Programme in East and Central Africa. From January to June 2018, she was a Ruth Glass Fellow with residency at the London School of Economics and Political Science. Her training in Medical Anthropology were in the University of Amsterdam and Leiden University, in the Netherlands - where she was a NUFFIC and WOTRO fellow, respectively. Since 2012, she was appointed a Research Fellow at the African Studies Centre in Leiden University. Her main research interests include how young people in complex emergencies and the context of HIV/AIDS identify, prioritise and manage their health complaints. In this regard, she has published many articles and book chapters focusing on former child soldiers, silencing of distressed children in the context of war as a coping mechanism and the oughtness of care during EVD epidemic. Her book, *Wartime children's suffering and quest for therapy in northern Uganda* was awarded a PhD premium by the Amsterdam School for Social Science Research, in the academic year of 2008/2009.

KOPALAPILLAI AMIRTHALINGAM

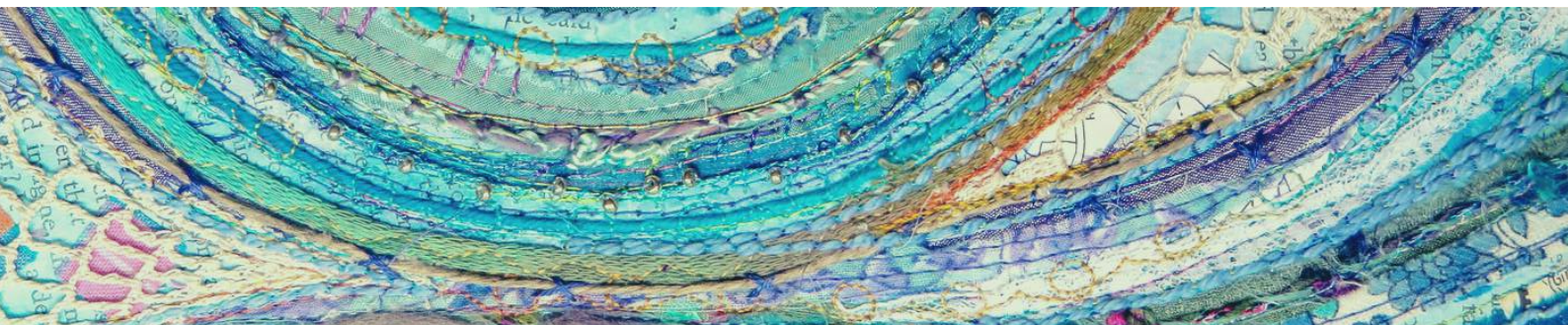

Dr Kopalapillai Amirthalingam is Professor in Economics at the Department of Economics, University of Colombo, Sri Lanka. He works both as a researcher and development consultant with a special interest in displacement, migration, public finance, and Sri Lankan economy. He has been a consultant for the Presidential Tax Commission in 2009 and he currently is a member of Experts Committee to Formulate the National Sustainable Development Vision of Sri Lanka until 2030, appointed by His Excellency President. Amirthalingam is a researcher for several projects, including the IDRC-funded Involuntary Resettlement: A Cross Country Study on Urban Inequality and Poverty and Diasporas in Conflict Settings: Neglected Agents of Change projects. His work has appeared in leading journals such as Journal of Refugee Studies, Disasters, Migration and Development, Sri Lanka Economic Journal and Colombo Business Journal. He has presented his research works at prestigious conferences such as the annual conferences of the Refugee Studies Centre (RSC), annual conference of Canadian Association for Refugee and Forced Migration Studies (CARFMS), and the International Association for Feminist Economics (IAFFE). He has numerous journal articles and book sections to his credit. He holds a PhD from the University of Colombo, received MPhil from the Jawaharlal University, New Delhi and the BA from the University of Jaffna.

KELLY-JO BLUEN

Kelly-Jo Bluen is a PhD candidate at the London School of Economics. She is also an editor of Millennium: Journal of International Studies. Her research examines articulations of humanity as a constituent community or normative basis for atrocity crimes in International Criminal Justice through the lenses of anti-colonial and decolonial theories of the human and considers the ways in which it produces white innocence and raced articulations of humanity. Prior to commencing her PhD she worked as a newspaper columnist for the Business Day and ran a project on accountability for sexual and gender-based violence in conflict at the Institute for Justice and Reconciliation in South Africa.

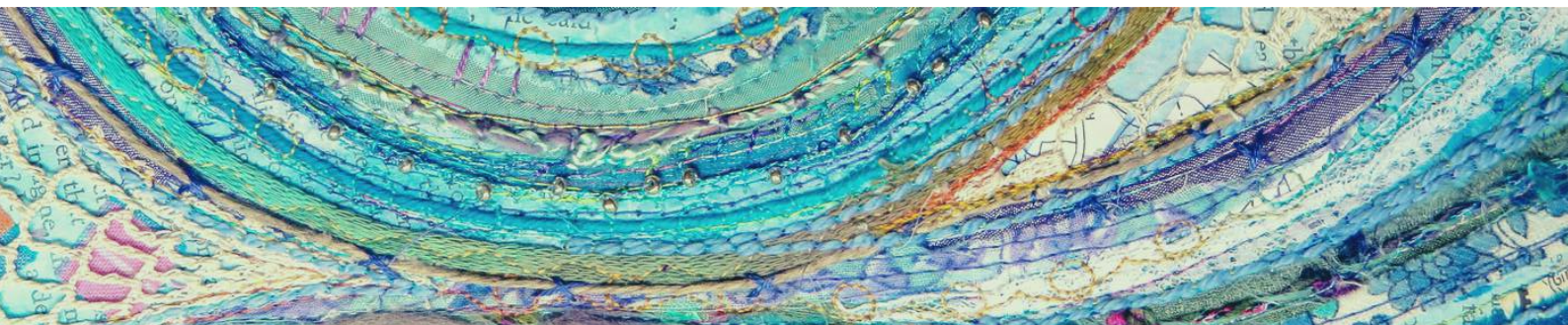

She is the author of many articles on international law and human rights law, in particular on the human rights of women. She is co-author of *The Boundaries of International Law: a Feminist Analysis* (MUP, 2000, with Hilary Charlesworth), *The Making of International Law* (OUP, 2007, with Alan Boyle) and *International Law and New Wars* (CUP, 2017 with Mary Kaldor).

NELOUFER DE MEL (NOT PRESENT IN KAMPALA)

Neloufer de Mel is Chair Professor of English at the Dept. of English, University of Colombo, Sri Lanka. She is the author of *Militarizing Sri Lanka: Popular Culture, Memory and Narrative in the Armed Conflict* (2007), and *Women and the Nation's Narrative: Gender and Nationalism in 20th Century Sri Lanka* (2001). Her recent publications have been on postwar Sri Lanka, providing a feminist, cultural studies perspective on questions of transitional justice, development, security, the law, gender, and art. She has also been the co-editor and/or lead author of several volumes of which *Broadening Gender: Why Masculinities Matter* (2013), and *Reframing Democracy: Perspectives on the Cultures of Inclusion and Exclusion in Contemporary Sri Lanka* (2012) constitute her more recent work. She has held several distinguished research fellowships including a Senior Fulbright Research Fellowship at Yale University where she was also a Postdoctoral Associate in 2009, the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Fellowship, and visiting fellowships at the Institute for Human Sciences, Vienna, the Universities of Zurich and New York, and the Five College Women's Studies Research Center, USA. Prof. de Mel is a member of the Board of the Center for the Study of Human Rights, University of Colombo, and a member of the Research and Development Committee of the University of Colombo.

CHRIS DOLAN

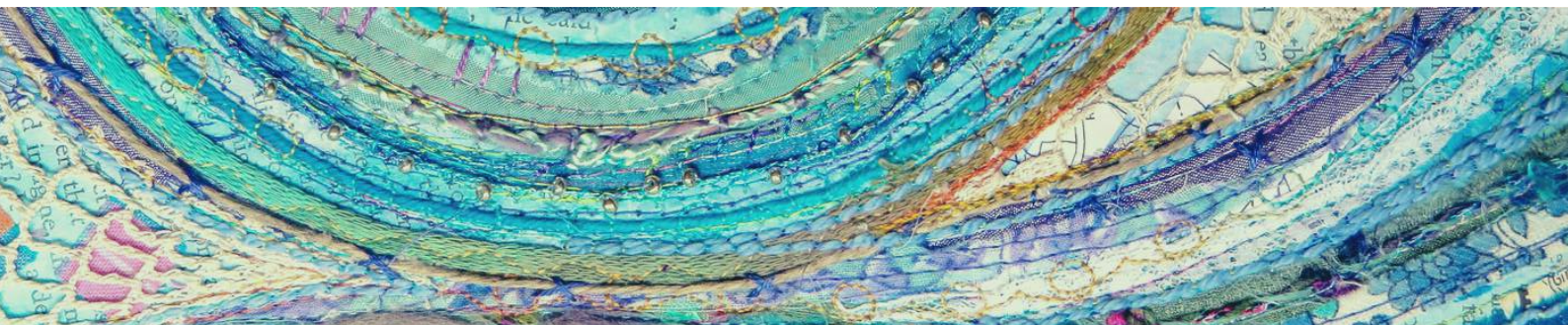

Dr Chris Dolan is Director of the Refugee Law Project, Makerere University Uganda (2006 to date), a Visiting Professor at Ulster University's Transitional Justice Institute and International Conflict Research Institute in Belfast, and a trainer and roster-member for Justice Rapid Response. He combines extensive work with survivors of conflict-related sexual violence with research, training and global advocacy for Inclusive Gender, approaches to gender-based violence that include male and LGBTI survivors of such violence, systematic screening of refugees for war-related injuries, and more holistic and comprehensive investigations into sexual violence against men as a war crime, crime against humanity and genocide. This is reflected in films, documentaries, published articles, guest lectures and media coverage. With Professors Stern and Baaz he is involved in a study of the forms, contexts, logics and discourses of sexual violence, as well as with a York University project on Conjugal Slavery. Policy influence includes drafting UNHCR's 2012 Guidance Note on working with male victims, revisions to IASC's GBV Guidelines (2015), contributions to the International Protocol on Documenting and Investigating Sexual Violence in Conflict (2017), articles in the ICRC Review, and a chapter in the 2018 Oxford Handbook on Gender & Conflict, Victims who are Men.

ZOE GILLARD

Zoe Gillard is Chief Operating Officer of the UKRI GCRF Gender, Justice and Security Hub, with overall responsibility for the effective delivery of professional services. American University of Iraq, Sulaimani

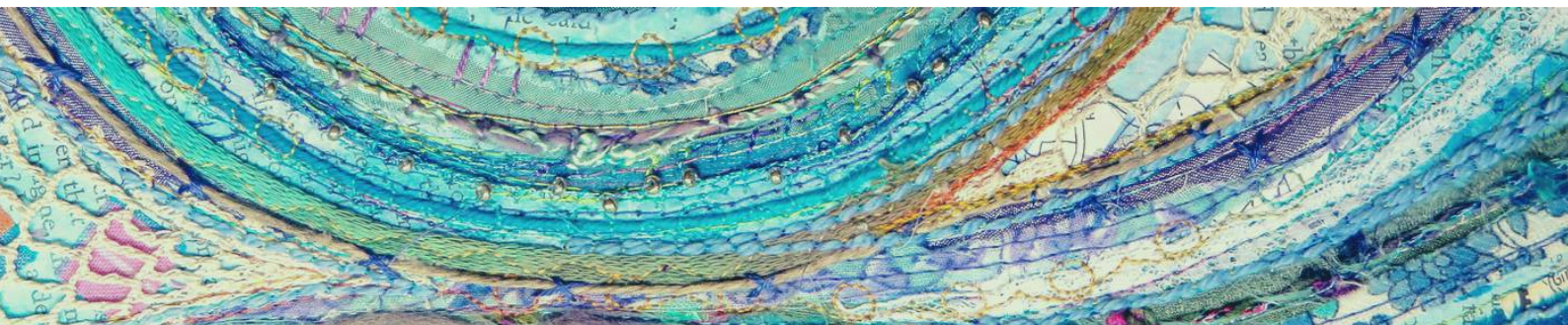
Choman Hardi is Founding Director of the the Center for Gender and Development Studies (CGDS) at the American University of Iraq, Sulaimani (AUIS). A poet, writer and academic researcher she was former Poet-In-Residence at Moniack Mhor Writers Centre (Scotland), Villa Hellebosch (Belgium), and Hedgebrook Women Writers' Retreat (USA). She has performed her work in the UK, Europe, USA, India, Malaysia, and Taiwan. She has published three collections of poetry in Kurdish and her first English collection, *Life for Us*, was published by Bloodaxe in 2004 and reprinted eighteen months later. In 2006 she became one of the youngest poets whose work was displayed as part of the 'Poems on the Underground' program. Choman has facilitated poetry workshops for Exiled Writers Ink, Apples and Snakes, New Writing Partnerships, Spread the Word, Accademi, The South Bank, The Arvon Foundation and the British Council. In 2007 she facilitated a series of poetry workshops for the young people in Kurdistan through the Youth Culture Houses in different towns and cities. In 2005 she was awarded a two year post-doctoral research scholarship by the Leverhulme Trust to research about the widows of genocide in Iraqi Kurdistan and during which she was associated with the Uppsala Program for Holocaust and Genocide Studies. The resulting book, *Gendered Experiences of Genocide: Anfal Survivors in Kurdistan-Iraq* (Ashgate, 2011), was chosen by the Yankee Book Peddler as a UK Core Title. It was translated into Turkish by Avesta publishing in 2013. She has presented some of her findings at academic conferences in the UK, USA, Oslo, Berlin, Amsterdam, and Sarajevo.

MAZEDA HOSSAIN

Hub Co-Director

London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine

Dr Mazedra Hossain is a social epidemiologist at the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine. She conducts community-based and health systems research in conflict-affected and fragile settings. She specialises in research on health and gender based violence among populations affected by conflict such as refugees, asylum seekers, trafficked persons and



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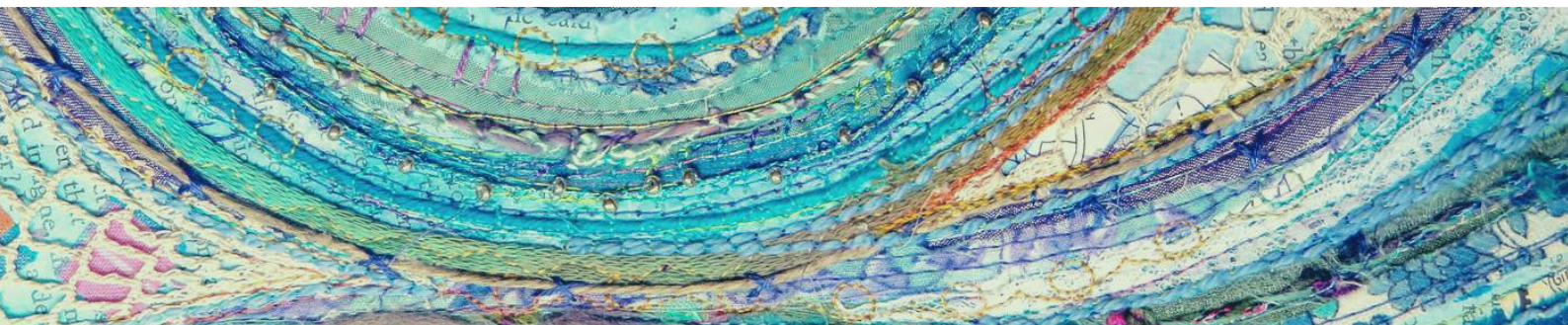
forcibly displaced populations. Her main research include: developing epidemiological methods and measurements appropriate for conflict and fragile settings; and developing and testing interventions to prevent and respond to gender based violence among conflict-affected populations. She conducts research on violence against women, men and adolescents, reproductive and sexual health, mental health, disability, social norms, and health services. She has led multi-disciplinary and multi-country research collaborations focused on violence prevention or health care response among conflict-affected populations. She regularly collaborates with humanitarian agencies such as the International Rescue Committee, Save the Children, UNHCR, and the World Health Organization and previous funders include the ESRC, Wellcome Trust and DfID.

PAUL KIRBY

Dr Paul Kirby is a Fellow at the LSE Centre for Women, Peace and Security, and will co-direct the Masculinities and Sexualities project of the GCRF Gender, Justice and Security Hub. Paul is also Lecturer in International Security at the University of Sussex. His interests are principally in feminist approaches to wartime sexual violence, critical war studies, and the politics of the Women, Peace and Security agenda. He has authored several pieces on these themes in the *European Journal of International Relations*, *International Affairs*, *Men and Masculinities* and *International Feminist Journal of Politics*. Within the Hub, Paul's work packages will investigate contemporary feminist foreign policy initiatives and emerging efforts to govern and reform violent masculinities. With Laura Shepherd, he is editor of the Centre for Women, Peace and Security's working paper series, and with Laura Shepherd and Soumita Basu, editor of the forthcoming *New Directions in Women, Peace and Security*.

ELEONORE KOFMAN

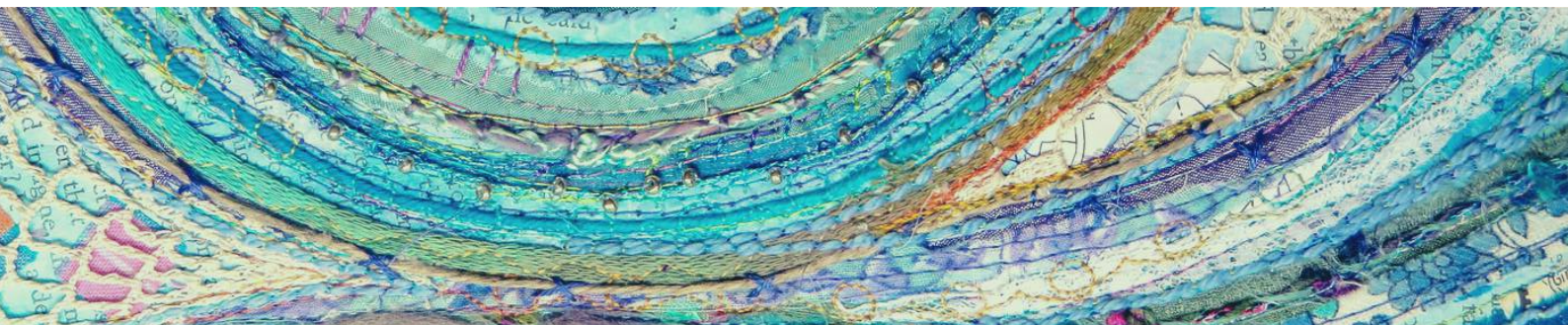

Eleonore Kofman is Professor of Gender, Migration and Citizenship and Co-Director of the Social Policy Research Centre at Middlesex University and Visiting Professor at the Institute of Global Affairs, LSE. She has extensive experience of conducting research on theoretical and policy aspects of diverse aspects of gendered migration. Projects and reports have been funded by the AHRC, ESRC, European Commission, IOM, UN Women and Office of the Childrens Commissioner, UK. Several of these focus on implications for families of global mobility. Currently I am conducting research on PHS-QUALITY - Job Quality and Industrial Relations in the Personal and Household Services Sector(DG Employment, Social Affairs and Inclusion) and on the Responsible Deal: where and how to protect and integrate Syrian refugees (Wellcome Trust, Riksbankens Jubileumsfond and the Volkswagen Foundation). Last year she was fellow at the programme In Search of the Global Labour Market, ZIF University of Bielefeld, Germany. She is on the Executive Board of IMISCOE (Network on Migration and Social Cohesion in Europe) and is Joint Chief Editor of Work, Employment and Society. She is the co-author of Gendered Migrations and Global Social Reproduction, Palgrave, 2015 and has published articles in International Migration, Journal of Ethnic and Migration Studies and Social Politics.

FIONNUALA NÍ AOLÁIN (NOT PRESENT IN KAMPALA)

Hub Co-Director
Queens University Belfast, University of Minnesota

Professor Fionnuala Ní Aoláin is concurrently Professor of Law at the Queens University, School of Law, Belfast and Regents Professor and Robina Professor of Law, Public Policy and Society at the University of Minnesota Law School. She has published extensively in the fields of emergency powers, conflict regulation, transitional justice and sex based violence in times of war. Her book Law in Times of Crisis (CUP 2006) was awarded the American Society



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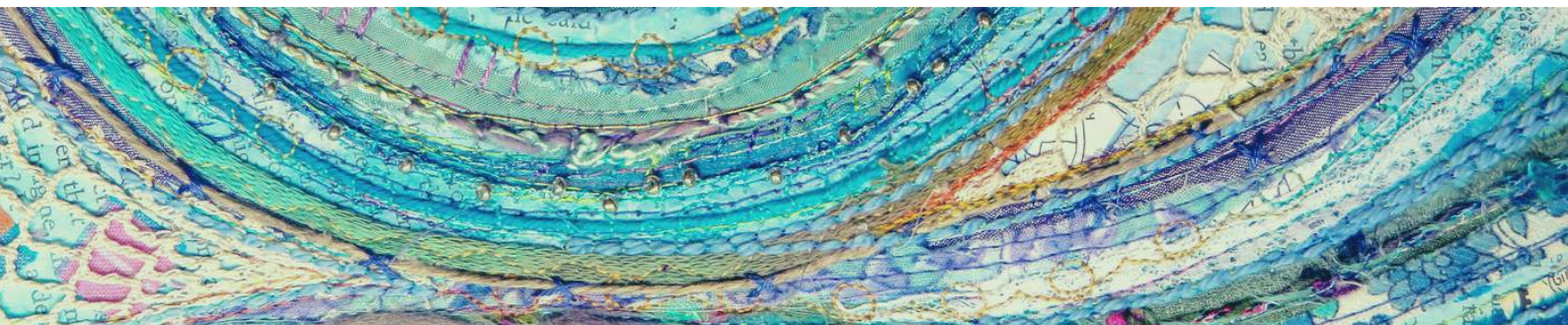
of International Law's preeminent prize in 2007 - the Certificate of Merit for creative scholarship. Other books include *On the Frontlines: Gender, War and the Post Conflict Process* (Oxford University Press 2011) and *Exceptional Courts and Military Commissions in Comparative Perspective* (Cambridge University Press 2013, with Gross). She recently edited the *Oxford Handbook on Gender and Conflict* (2017). Professor Ní Aoláin is currently the United Nations Special Rapporteur on the Protection and Promotion of Human Rights while Countering Terrorism. In 2003, she was appointed by the Secretary-General of the United Nations as Special Expert on promoting gender equality in times of conflict and peace-making. In 2011, she was appointed as consultant jointly by the Office of the High Commissioner on Human Rights and UN WOMEN to prepare a Study on Reparations for Conflict Related Sexual Violence. She was appointed by the Irish Minister of Justice to the Irish Human Rights Commission in 2000 and served until 2005. She remains an elected member of the Executive Committee for the Belfast-based Committee on the Administration of Justice, and is also a member of the Irish Council for Civil Liberties. She is chair of the International Women's Program Board at the Open Society Foundations (since 2010).

RORY O'CONNELL

Dr Rory O'Connell joined the Transitional Justice Institute (TJI) and School of Law in 2013 as Professor of Human Rights and Constitutional Law. He was appointed TJI Director in 2014.

Rory's research and teaching interests are in the areas of Human Rights and Equality, Constitutional Law and Legal Theory. He is a member of the project team on the ESRC project 'Brexit and Northern Ireland: The Constitutional, Conflict Transformation, Human Rights and Equality Consequences' #BrexitLawNI. During his Law degree at University College Dublin, he spent a year as an ERASMUS student at the Université de Rouen. In



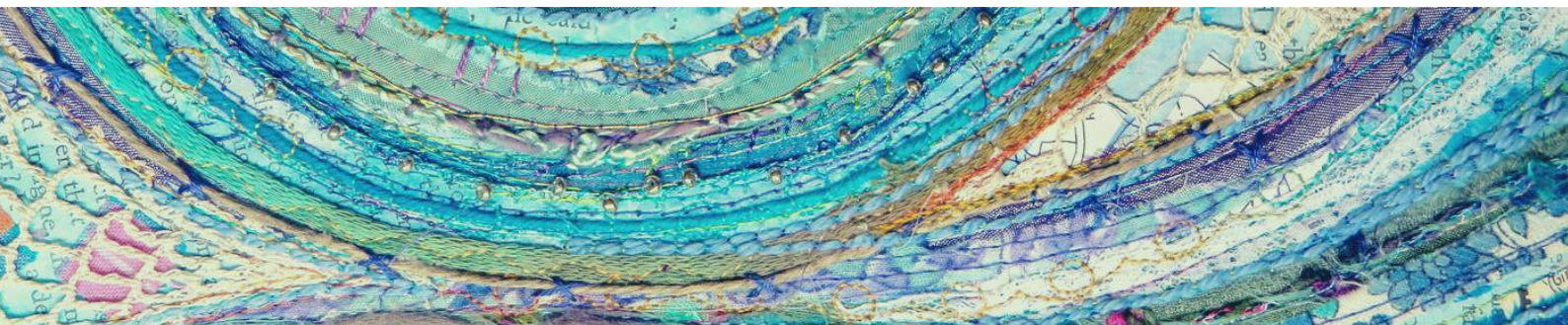

Stephen Oola is the co-founder and director of Amani Institute, a think-tank based in Gulu, northern Uganda. Oola is an Advocate (Attorney) in the High Court of Uganda. Between 2013 and 2016, Oola was head of the Conflict, Transitional Justice and Governance Program at the Refugee Law Project (RLP), School of Law, Makerere University in Kampala. Previously, he led the Research and Advocacy Department at RLP from 2010-2012 and conducted a countrywide reconciliation and transitional justice audit in Uganda (2011-2012). From 2007-2009, Oola was the Transitional Justice Lawyer at RLP. He holds a LLB (Hons) Degree from Makerere University, Master of Arts in International Peace Studies from the University of Notre Dame, USA. A Pre-Doctoral Fellow at the University of Antwerp, Belgium (2012), Oola's interest and expertise is on Transitional Justice, Peacebuilding and Development in Africa. Oola led the drafting of the proposed National Reconciliation Bill for Uganda, the African Union Transitional Justice Policy Framework, and the JMEC's M&E Strategy for South Sudan. Oola is also a member of African Commission on Human & People's Rights Advisory Committee on the Study on Transitional Justice in Africa.

DANIEL OSINDE

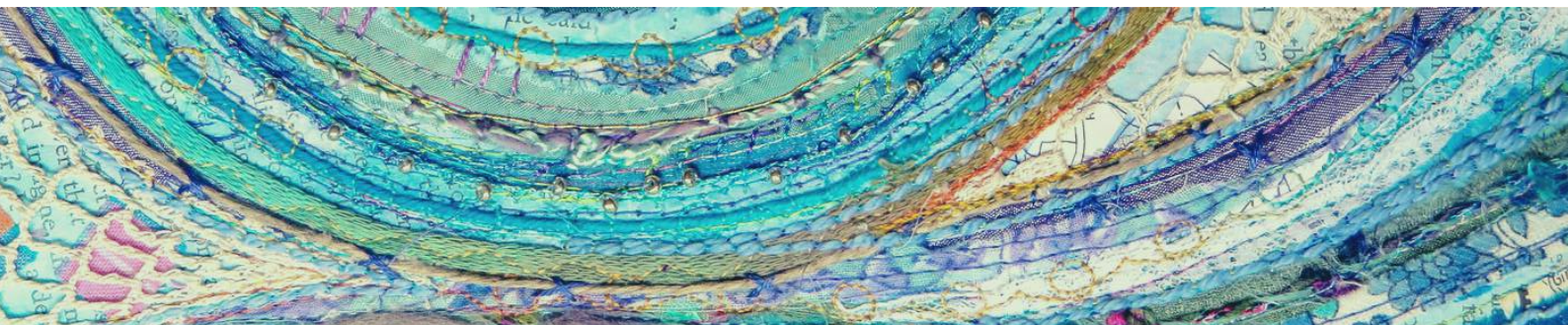

Dr Angelika Rettberg earned her PhD from Boston University. She is a full professor at the Political Science Department at Universidad de los Andes (Bogotá – Colombia), where she leads the Research Program on Armed Conflict and Peacebuilding. She is also a Global Fellow at the Peace Research Institute of Oslo (PRIO). From January until August 2018 she served as a negotiator for the Colombian government in the peace talks with the Colombian guerrilla group Ejército de Liberación Nacional (ELN). Her research has focused on aspects of the political economy of armed conflict and peacebuilding, such as the relationship between legal resources, armed conflict, and crime as well as the dynamics of transitional justice and reconciliation. She has also conducted research on the private sector as a political actor and, specifically, on business behavior in contexts of armed conflict and peacebuilding. Her research has been funded by the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation, the International Development Research Centre of Canada (IDRC), the One Earth Future Foundation (OEF), Social Science Research Council, the Colombian Institute for Science and Technology, the Friedrich Ebert Stiftung (FESCOL), the World Bank, the United Nations Development Program (UNDP), the Gesellschaft für Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ), the Norwegian Foreign Ministry, and the Universidad de los Andes. She regularly contributes to the public media on topics related to the Colombian peacebuilding process. She has also been a regular advisor and commentator on issues related to peace and peacebuilding at a global level.

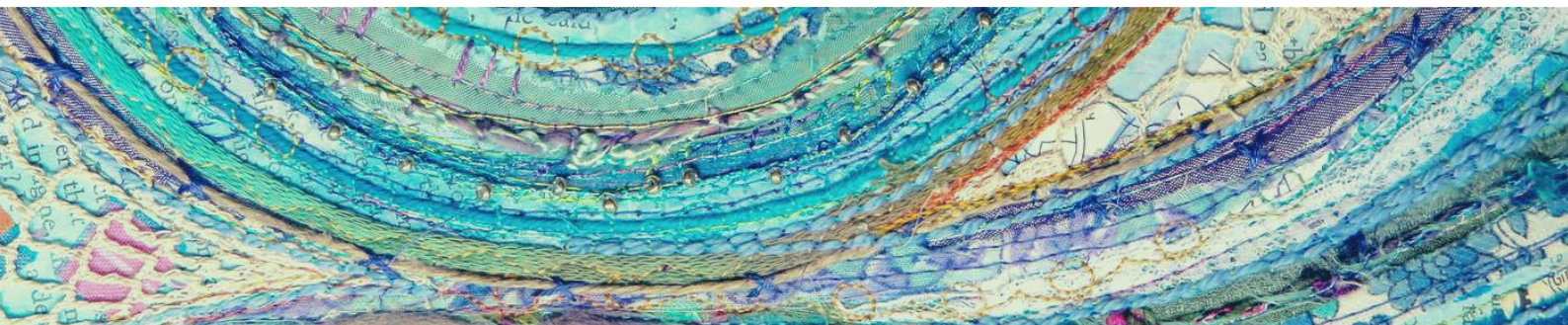

LAURA SHEPHERD (NOT PRESENT IN KAMPALA)

University of Sydney

Laura J. Shepherd is Professor of International Relations at the University of Sydney. Her primary research focuses on the United Nations Security Council's 'Women, Peace and Security' agenda. She has written extensively on the formulation of UNSCR1325 and subsequent Women, Peace and Security resolutions. She is currently working on a project examining the formation and implementation of the Women, Peace and Security agenda at national and international levels, funded by the Australian Research Council, and she also holds an ARC Future Fellowship to study the relationship between the Women, Peace and Security agenda and counter-terrorism/countering violent extremism initiatives in Australia, the UK, and Sweden. Laura is particularly interested in gender, security and violence, and she has strong interests in pedagogy and popular culture. Laura is author/editor of several books, including, most recently *Gender, UN Peacebuilding and the Politics of Space* (Oxford University Press, 2017) and *Routledge Handbook of Gender & Security* (edited with Caron Gentry and Laura Sjoberg; Routledge, 2019). Her work has appeared in journals such as *European Journal of International Relations*, *International Affairs*, and *International Feminist Journal of Politics* and she blogs semi-regularly for *The Disorder of Things*.
